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Course Objectives

This course explores Russian foreign policy in the contemporary world, with an eye on the deep historical context that informs the relationships between Russia and the rest of the world, and the unique Russian position as a bridge between the West and the East.

We begin with an introduction to why Russia and its foreign policy are highly relevant in the contemporary world, along with a discussion of Russia's major foreign policy concerns. Throughout the course, close attention will be paid to how historical and contemporary themes and events drive Russia towards certain perspectives in foreign policy that may seem strange to the Western world. The course concludes with a look at the future of Russian foreign policy, and its prospects for democratization.

Major topics covered include Russia's history and relationships with the Muslim world, America and the West, China and East Asia, and the developing world. Particular attention is paid to Russia's relationship with the former Soviet Empire since the fall of communism, and the effect of Color Revolutions and the Arab Spring upon the Putin regime's efforts in international relations. In addition, we discuss various environmental issues' effects on Russia's relations with its neighbors, security issues such as terrorism and nuclear proliferation, and how Russia's concern with spheres of influence interacts with an often post-geopolitical west.

Assignments & Grading

Reading will be assigned for each class. Students should come to class having read the assigned material and being ready to discuss it. Lectures will be designed to supplement the material covered in the readings. Please come to office hours (or schedule a meeting with me if you have a conflict) if you have any trouble understanding the material, or if you have any questions about the course at all as the semester progresses.

Students will be evaluated on the basis of three small papers (called "intelligence estimates"), a research paper that will be completed in stages (called "research briefings") through the semester, and periodic quizzes. The proportion each of these is worth to the final grade is listed below:

Quizzes (25%) (In class, throughout semester) Intelligence Estimates (25%) (Three, due 2/17, 3/3, and 3/31) Research Briefs (25%) (throughout semester) Final Paper (25%) (due Friday, 5/8, by 5pm)

Quizzes

Quizzes will be given at least once per week on the assigned readings. They will generally be multiple choice, with the exception being the map quiz of the former Soviet world that will be taken in class on Tuesday, 1/27.

Intelligence Estimates

These short papers (750 words each) will be on current events topics assigned over the course of the semester. Students will be responsible for succinctly but comprehensively presenting the background and policy implications of a current issue in Russian foreign policy.

Final Papers and Research Briefs

The final papers will be written in stages over the course of the semester. In the first two weeks of the semester, students will identify a research question they want to answer appropriate to the course's subject matter, turn in a summary of the question and their approach to it, and generate a reading list for the semester. Over the course of the semester, students will write a single page on each of their sources, summarizing the arguments of each and how they help answer the student's research question (these assignments are labeled "research briefs"). This work will be used as the body of evidence for the final paper, which will be 2500 words in length and due by 5pm on Friday, 5/8.

When grading the final paper, if a student writes less than the minimum length, the paper will be graded out of the percent of the assignment that was written. For example, a 2000 word paper will be graded you out of 80%.
